Over time, you might find yourself becoming more impatient, frustrated, bored, apathetic, resigned, disengaged or aggressive. When cut off from the roots of authentic relationship, it's easy to lose credibility, integrity, enthusiasm, joy and the capacity to be kind.

TIME OUT

When leadership "tools" become weapons it is a signal that leadership has gone amuck. Broken relationships signal the need to start down a new road. Needless deaths, burnout and debilitating breakdowns announce it's time to STOP. They signal a halt to business as usual.
